OLD TOWN TRIANGLE ELECTIONS HELD IN JANUARY, CHANGES CONTINUE

Work goes forward

The Annual Old Town Board of Directors election was held Jan. 22, with Philip Graff winning as president, Uncontested candidates Shannon Waterfield and Todd Humes became 1st Vice President and Secretary respectively. Tom Mirdura was elected treasurer. Beth Burk and Robin Cecola were elected directors.

Votes were tallied by the accounting firm of Ruzicka & Associates, LTD. Their certified report to the Association is below:

Since the election Humes and Waterfield, resigned their positions in mid-March, citing differences with board operations.

Burk also resigned due to separate issues effective after the April Board meeting. Burk continued to head the bylaws committee until that time when she hopes the bylaws issues will be resolved. Dirk Vos, Robin Cecola and Tom Midura, have also resigned, all expressing a wish to avoid conflict within the community as their reason for stepping down. Cecola and Midura will remain on the Board through the April Board meeting.

Debbie Day will become Secretary, Jeff Smith the First Vice President, and Tom Bracken a director. All have been appointed according to Association bylaws and have agreed to serve. Remaining vacancies will be filled according to Association bylaws.

Despite these setbacks the Board remains committed to bring the ambitious plans of last year's Board's Long Range Plan to fruition. These plans include more events meant to appeal to a broader demographic, coordinated cooperation with the Old Town Merchants and Residents Association, and developing a more vibrant and relevant online presence leveraging interactivity and social media tools; all of this aimed at attracting a larger more engaged membership.

"These decisions were not taken lightly, but were the result of a year-long association evaluation the work of a long-range planning committee, who undertook a public survey of association members and made evaluations based on that survey," Graff said.

"It has been a difficult process," said Graff, "but the Association will move forward in a positive manner."

The celebrated Old Town Association Art Fair (OTAF) celebrates its 62nd anniversary on June 11-12, in the Old Town Triangle District, as 260 nationally acclaimed artists and an estimated 50,000 art lovers wander the charming brick-paved, tree lined streets. The fair is scheduled this year from 10 a.m., until 6 p.m., June 11-12, rain or shine.

This year the AmericanStyle Magazine has named the Old Town Air Fair as one of the top 10 destinations fairs in the country.

The artists featured in this year's Old Town Art Fair were chosen by an independent jury of professional artists, gallery owners and museum curators. As with every year, the Old Town Art Fair will feature a wide range of art mediums, including 2D- and 3D- mixed media, drawing, painting, photography, printmaking, ceramics, fiber, glass, jewelry, and works in metal, stone, and wood.

Proceeds from the Old Town Art Fair, located at Lincoln Ave. and Wisconsin St., benefit a host of local youth groups, schools and neighborhood preservation projects. A gate donation of \$7.00 is requested for adults, with no donation requested for children 12 and under.

VOLUNTEER FOR THE FAIR

The Old Town Art Fair (OTAF) is one of the few Chicago street fairs that is completely planned, staffed and managed by volunteers. Each year, a group of 30 neighbors gather to plan the Old Town Art Fair and we rely on the help of over 750 volunteers to staff the event.

We would love to welcome you to our volunteer team! We need help in the following areas:

Booth Sitting: These volunteers assist our artists by looking after their booth while they take a break to visit food court or the rest of the fair. These volunteers general work 2-3 hour shifts.

Gate Captain: These volunteers oversee activity at our seven entrance gates, and are responsible for staffing a portion of their gate. Training is provided at a workshop in early June. Gate Captains work from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m.

Gate Volunteer: These volunteers greet OTAF patrons, distribute programs, and collect donations. These volunteers generally work 2-3 hour shifts.

Merchandise Volunteer: These volunteers staff the merchandise tables, selling OTAF apparel, souvenirs and posters. These volunteer generally work 2-3 hour shifts.

Other highlights of the 2011 OTAF include the "Gallery of Gardens" (a garden walk through more than 50 urban home gardens), a music stage featuring local talent, a children's corner offering arts and crafts activities, and a food court populated by local food vendors. Souvenir stores throughout the fair offer posters, t-shirts and other Old Town Art Fair collectibles.

The night before the art fair, The First Sight party, celebrates the annual event with a silent auction for 220 people in the Triangle neighborhood, where artists donate pieces for advance sale to raise additional funds.

The art fair began in 1949 as the "Old Town Holiday," that invited artistic residents to display their work. A 25-cent donation was collected to raise money for improved living, working and recreational conditions in the area. Today's Old Town Art Fair is a great leap from neighbors hanging art on fences.

The Old Town Art Fair is one of the few Chicago street fairs that is completely planned, staffed and managed by volunteers. Each year, a group of 30 neighbors gather to plan the Old Town Art Fair and 750 volunteers staff the event.

Volunteers are needed for booth sitting, as gate captains and volunteers, or merchandise volunteers, who staff merchandise tables selling OTAF apparel, souvenirs and posters.

NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENTS COMMITTEE BEGINS SEASONAL TASKS

Annual Spring Cleanup Set for May 7

It is that time of year, when the Neighborhood Improvements Committee (NIC), never dormant, launches into high gear. Projects now moved to the front burner include the Annual Spring Cleanup, set for May 7. This annual event precedes the Annual Art Fair in June, and is a way to ensure that the neighborhood is up to snuff for that annual event.

Neighbors are to meet at the Triangle Center, 1763 N. North Park, at 9 a.m. There will be coffee and rolls before starting out. The city, as usual, will provide some shovels, brooms, and trash bags.

Other neighborhood improvement events this spring include:

• The Old Town Parkways Tree Program, where the Association will help residents replace the trees through Care of Trees. At the Triangle's expense, trees will be evaluated, if they need to be maintained a cost will be given the resident. If they need to be removed, Care of Trees will pay 20 percent of the cost and the city will be contacted do to the work. If the resident decides to use another service that is at the expense of the resident. To participate in Care of Trees contact the Triangle. Please be prepared to give your name, address and telephone number, e-mail address, and the exact location of the tree you would like to have assessed. The Triangle office number is 312-337-1938.

- The Triangle will replace five trashcans in the neighborhood and has approached three businesses and a school to see if they would like to replace the ones on their site.
- The maintenance of area parks has begun, with playground equipment being repaired in the park on Sedgwick.
- Finally, the wildly successful brick replacement program continues, with the Triangle again participating in replacement at a rate of 20 percent of the cost. Replacement must be pre-approved by the Association and be done by an Association approved vendor. To participate, measure the estimated square foot area, contact the Triangle at BrickProgram@otta.org; after notification of acceptance, contact brick program volunteer, Shannon Raglin Cecola at 312.475.3152. She will help order bricks, obtain City of Chicago permits and coordinate installation dates.

OTTA GRANT APPLICANTS WANTED

Deadline April 15

With proceeds from the annual Old Town Art Fair, the Old Town Triangle Association offers grants to several area groups each year. Grants are awarded in May and December, with the current deadline April 15 to receive funds in May.

In the past grants have been given to schools, projects and area organizations in keeping with the Old Town Triangle mission of supporting education, the arts and groups and activities that are in concert with the goals of the association.

Among those receiving funds last year were the Chicago Lakefront Sculpture Exhibit, which displays large scale sculptures in the 43rd and 44th ward, Lincoln Park High School to buy music instruments and for two Performing Art college scholarships; LaSalle Language Academy to fund an artist-inresidency project that studied our local architecture; Lincoln Elementary School for computers, as well as Franklin Fine Arts School. Among others also receiving funding were the Oz Park youth baseball program, the Lincoln Park rowing team, Story Time at Lincoln Park Zoo and Lincoln Park Village for two lowcost senior memberships.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Last year the Capital Improvements Committee was tasked with the goal of aiding in the restoration and preservation of the Old Town Triangle Association's "home" at 1763 N. North Park. Last fall the Board approved a schedule of projects and we are happy to report back that a much-needed new floor is scheduled to be installed right after our annual Art Fair. The replacement will take about a week, and association members will be advised in advance of when the work is taking place. Additionally, we have selected new windows (working with the Chicago Landmark Commission), similar to the current existing ones, to be installed at roughly the same time as the new flooring. The windows bars will be painted as well. As soon as the weather warms up a bit more, the front doors will be sanded and stained as well as having the building tuckpointed. Our "home" should be all spruced up as we head into summer! T

TRIANGLE AD-HOC BYLAWS COMMITTEE FINISHES CURRENT TASK

Committee chair steps down from association board.

The Ad Hoc Bylaws Committee finished its third and final meeting March 28, and submitted its' recommendations to the Association Board at the April 12 board meeting for consideration. The committee was formed after the January elections when questions were raised about procedures and other issues.

Beth Burk, board member, served as chair of the committee and was joined by board members, Jacqueline Thams and Phil Graff, board president, on the committee. She resigned from the board effective April 12.

Among the issues discussed were changes in election procedures designed to address questions about voting procedures this past election. Among the other items discussed was the makeup of Board committees, and the allocation of funds.

One of the participants remarked afterward that given the recent turmoil in the community, he was surprised that the committee work was cordial and respectful.

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE LOOKING AT WEBSITE DESIGN

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URBAN COYOTES FREELY ROAM OLD TOWN TRIANGLE STREETS

Chicago Residents Advised Not to Approach

During the March 7 candidate forum for the 43rd Ward, as neighborhood residents entered the Old Town Triangle Center, a coyote casually sauntered up the street, not stopping to join in the group discussion.

The coyote didn't look much different from the Triangle dogs — maybe taller, skinnier with pointy ears and nose.

Turns out this is not such an astonishing incident.

Triangle neighbors, such as the Lincoln Park Zoo, frequently see coyotes at night, and aware there are predators in their midst, take precautions, and "put the flamingos up for the night," according to a zoo spokesman.

The 43rd Ward office says that there have been reported coyote sightings, but they are infrequent and none of late.

Triangle residents speculate that the disappearance of rabbits, and other four-legged rodents, might be due to the influx of coyotes. Coyotes eat whatever is available – small rodents mostly, like vols. They have been known to attack cats, Canada geese, white tail deer, and small dogs. Other more ambitious coyotes have attempted to try their luck with large dogs, such as boxers and labs, but without much success. Some residents near Chicago's Swedish Hospital, long accustomed to the ambulance sirens, now find that they are accompanied by coyote howling. Ald. Patrick O'Connor of the 40th Ward, says many residents near the hospital have heard the howls and have reported seeing coyotes , mainly in Budlong Woods.

In late March, a one-year-old coyote was rescued from the LaSalle Street overpass at Stockton Dr., by Animal Care and Control. The coyote, the second to be captured in the city this

> year, was relocated to the Flint Creek Wildlife Rehabilitation, with centers near Itasca and Barrington.

Coyotes vanished from the Chicago area by the end of the 19th century, but they've made a comeback in recent years. O'Connor reminds residents to be cautious if they encounter a coyote.
