GRANTS AWARDS SPOTLIGHT

LANDSCAPING THE PLAZA – ST. MICHAEL CHURCH IN OLD TOWN | By Diane Fitzgerald (Triangle resident since 1997)

Chicago's Old Town "legend," St. Michael Church in Old Town, is recognized as the heart and soul of the Triangle, situating itself here in 1848 and barely surviving the Great Fire of 1871. The burning of their church stirred the determination of the mostly German parishioners. With great pride and little self-pity, these industrious men and women set about rebuilding their homes and the church. And what a church they built! With immense attention to beautiful detail and to creating a welcoming gathering place, they saw to it that St. Michael rose from the ashes.

Almost 165 years later, St. Michael is still beautifying itself and Old Town! The OTTA Grants Committee approved a grant for the church's Landscape the Plaza Matching Grant Program, which received a match-total of more than \$45,000 to replace the large planters at the front entrance, install benches, replace the brick wall of the "Secret Garden," and landscape that new "open garden." "We are a community of neighbors who gather to celebrate our shared faith. We are also stewards of an historical church that is a significant presence in the Old Town neighborhood," explains Father Santa, pastor of St. Michael, when describing the mission of the church and goal of the project. "The residents of the Old Town Triangle are nestled inside the boundaries of an historical landmark district. All of us are encouraged to maintain our properties and to repair-replace-renovate when necessary. This is our opportunity to renovate and be a good neighbor."


Every day, many hundreds of people walk through the church's plaza, once the drive-through street called Eugenie Terrace. It is not unusual to see people stop and sit on the planters to catch their breath and enjoy the neighborhood or listen to the church's bells. By spring, when the weather gets warmer, neighbors – especially dog walkers – can enjoy lingering in the St. Michael Plaza on newly installed benches that will replace two of the five original planters.

If you have the time and are so inclined, make sure to take in a docent tour of St. Michael, any Sunday following the 11 a.m. Mass. It is steeped in our history and rich with stories that matter. Sidebar: The Old Town Triangle Association was founded in 1948, 65 years ago and 100 years after Michael Diversey donated the land upon which St. Michael was built!

From the proceeds of the Old Town Art Fair, the Old Town Triangle Association gives back to the community each year by awarding several grants to schools, churches, and non-profit organizations. THE FIRST PERSON

THE THREE SIDES OF MY TRIANGLE | By Karen Loop Stephenson (Triangle resident since 1980)

My history with Old Town began in 1980, when I wandered from my Gold Coast neighborhood, and found one more akin to my hometown, Elkhart, Indiana. I stumbled upon a "For Rent" sign hanging on a brownstone on the 1700 block of Clark Street. After hours of walking the streets of the Old Town Triangle, I knew I had found my home. The architecture struck me so deeply. I have always loved history, and to find this area so well preserved was a dream. I rented the apartment on Clark Street, and that began my long love affair with this community.

I have purchased several properties throughout the years, which created my own "Triangle" within the "Triangle"--the first on North Park, the second on St. Paul and Wells, the other two back on North Park, where I now reside. The 1722 N. North Park residence was the most fulfilling of the properties, as it had a rich history that included being a church rectory and the meeting place for the "Old Town Players" and the Black Panthers - but most importantly, the home where my two children spent their formative years.

Chloe (24) and Riley (18) could not imagine being raised anywhere else. They cherish the warmth of the Old Town Triangle and the friends of all ages they have made over the years. As they have learned from those that have lived before them, they are also imparting knowledge to their younger Old Town friends. Chloe and

Riley know how lucky they are to have lived here. I look forward to watching new families plant their roots in Old Town and to observing these children as they grow up here, just like mine.

I believe that preserving our past is integral to building

our future. For many years I have participated on the OTTA Historic District Planning and Zoning Committee. It has been a great pleasure contributing my time to helping keep the neighborhood as charming as I first found it. I cannot imagine living anywhere else.

Editor's Note: Karen is one of those people who make our neighborhood a really beautiful place to live. She got hooked on rehabbing and renovating, and restored some of the Triangle's most significant properties, including four on N. North Park (1722, 1733, 1701, and 1717) and 204 St. Paul Avenue.

NEIGHBOR SPOTLIGHT | AND THE EMMY GOES TO...STEVE WEISS

Steve Weiss began shooting photos and Super 8 movies with his dad when he was 13 years old. This passion for filmmaking grew into a career of innovation, leading-edge product designs and award-winning web films. In fact, Steve and his production team at his Chicago firm, Zacuto (www.zacuto.com), were 2012 Emmy winners for Outstanding Achievement in Interview/Discussion Programming for Revenge of the Great Camera Shootout 2012, a web film that challenged some of the world's greatest cinematographers with an experiment that would answer an age-old question for the industry. The question is this: With the latest camera technology, is it the equipment or the skill and experience of the Director of Photography (DP) and their knowledge of their camera and post process that make for a great image?

Before Steve and his partner, former Triangle resident Jens Bogehegn, were nominated for Emmys and beginning in 1983, they were filmmakers-for-hire for Fortune 500 companies, producing historical videos, video news releases, and new product release videos. Lucyna Wojtas, Steve's wife, was editor of their production company. Then in 2000, Steve and Jens formed Zacuto Rentals, initially specializing in turnkey high-definition camera rental packages but quickly turning into a design shop where they created their own products. Today, their new product line has grown to over 215 items, making them leading trendsetters in camera accessories and camera package design.

But the call of the camera was loud and Steve and Jens missed making films. In 2008, they created their first webisodic series, <u>FilmFellas</u>, which has had eight individual casts and 40 episodes to date! Frequently nominated for industry awards, Zacuto films are a testament to the coming-of-age of web filmmaking and to the skill and determination of those who create web programs.

The answer to the question posed in Revenge? It's complicated...

What's not complicated is the wonderful world and life Steve, Lucy, and nine year-old daughter Isabel have created in the Triangle since 1999. Their beautiful home on Menomonee (circa 1873) was built from scraps and refuse, including burned wood from the Great Fire of 1871. Every year, the house is transformed into a spectacular "stage set" for Halloween, attracting people from near and far who marvel at it as they trick and treat through the neighborhood. At every season, Lucy tends their beautiful gardens, which now include the adjacent property – a former church renovated into a guest house – and wins awards from the Mayor of Chicago for them! There must be an awards room at The Weiss House?

Editor's Note: I asked Steve about the origins of his company's name, Zacuto, and there's a story. It's a family name in his mother's lineage with some celebrities dating back to 1492 Spain and Portugal. Columbus and Vasco de Gama were, well, colleagues. NEIGHBOR SPOTLIGHT POST-SCRIPT: SMALL WORLD STORY

<u>The Heart of Art: The Legacy of A. Glen Resch</u> appeared in the November/December Newsletter. This is a follow-up to the story in our previous issue by Amanda Resch Glascott (Glen's daughter and Triangle resident from 1975 – 1999).

In 1997, Glen was commissioned to paint a picture of someone's house, a typical occurrence, and he produced a lovely watercolor of 2446 N. Burling, as asked. When he delivered the painting, he realized that the customer actually lived at 2446 N. Orchard! He had gotten the two parallel streets mixed up and had painted the wrong house. So he went home, painted the right house, delivered it a week later, then put the wrong one in his old art cabinet—not wanting to throw it out but having no use for it. Fast-forward to 2011, when my husband, Mike Glascott, was helping my father move. He saw the painting and incredulously said, "This is the house my father grew up in—this is my grandparents' house!!" That wrong house my father had painted over a decade earlier, years before I met Mike, was coincidentally (or spookily!) my dad's future son-in-law's family's house.

Betty Fromm, a longtime resident of Old Town, is a Cardinals fan, community leader, activist, author, cat lover, stuffed animal collector, and a neighbor you should

know. Betty has served on several boards in the community, including the OTTA as President, Vice President, and Secretary. As an activist for the Lincoln Park community and President of Lincoln Park Conservation Association, she led the fight against high-rises on Lincoln Avenue.

Originally from St. Louis, she moved to Old Town in 1974 where she met her late husband, Walter Fromm, over a memorable lamb dinner at her neighbor's upstairs apartment. She resides in a

charming frame and brick house on N. Orleans Street with a grand English ivy garden in the front yard. Each year Betty opens her home and garden for the <u>Old Town Art Fair Garden Walk</u>, welcoming guests with refreshments and camaraderie.

Her passion is helping others and she has coauthored four books on the subject of "the human approach to patient care and caring for older loved ones," including such titles as <u>Treating and Caring: A Human Approach to Patient Care</u> and The <u>Dilemma of Caring</u>. She most recently wrote a children's book about Littler Red, a cat that presents illness and aging to children in a non-threatening way. The inspiration for this book came as the result of her four-month rehabilitation after a fall that broke her neck.

Her favorite things are her Kindle, her stuffed

animal collection, and her cat. And topping her list are "the good people in Old Town": The neighbors who introduced her to her husband, those who came to her rescue when she fell, fixed her door knob after she couldn't get into her house, and brought her good cheer and stuffed animals, just to name a few.

Betty continues her passion for helping others, volunteering weekly at Chicagoland Radio Information Service in a program for reading to people who are visually impaired. She also volunteers at the Lincoln Park Community Shelter. Some secrets she shares: She is not a cook, she never buys bread but she bakes her special recipe for Betty's Buns, and she loves eggs for breakfast and has a Toaster-Egg Poacher that does both at the same time!

OLD TOWN HISTORY THE OSCAR FOR BEST NEIGHBORHOOD GOES TO...

With the awards season well underway and the Academy Awards scheduled for Sunday, February 24th, it is hard to escape the celebrities, ceremonies, and red-carpet coverage that dominate this time of year. Even our small neighborhood has played its fair share of cameos over the years. So we thought it appropriate to mention a few favorite "Oscar-worthy" Old Town appearances.

The Fugitive – Harrison Ford plays Richard Kimble in this 1993 remake about a successful vascular surgeon who is wrongly convicted of murder. Ford is said to have fallen in love with the house at 336 W. Wisconsin Street after he and the Director met the property owner during early stages of production. This led to the director's decision to film some early scenes inside the house.

What Women Want – Did you know Bette Midler lived on Crilly Court? Well, at least that's where her character lived when she played the marriage counselor of Mel Gibson's character in this 2000 romantic comedy about a Chicago advertising executive who miraculously gains the ability to hear what women think.

The Dark Knight – Few could have missed this film crew when they shot several scenes of this 2008 movie around the Old Town Triangle. The crew exploded a car just west of Hudson Avenue, and filmed scenes at the unmistakable Twin Anchors bar on Sedgwick.

Our own Shirley Baugher (Triangle resident since 1978) even wrote about the movies made in the Triangle between 1907-1918 in her 2001 book *Our Old Town – The History of a Neighborhood*. She writes: "In the early 1900s, Chicago became, for a brief period, the motion picture capital of the world, and Old Town was an important part of that fame." She goes on to describe the Essanay Film Company, the Keystone Cops, Charlie Chaplin, and the dramas between the big personalities of the day. It's a fascinating read.

In November, after several months of hard work and collecting input, the OTTA board approved our Marketing & Communications Plan. TRIANGLE NO LONGER FLUSH WITH CASH AFTER BIG PLUMBING PROJECT!

A new plumbing project was completed recently at the Triangle Center. The hot water on the ground floor needed to be turned off until the source of a leak could be found. The situation was remedied by an innovative proposal from Devon Plumbing, the contractor who performed the work. New piping was installed near the ceiling by tapping into a pre-existing hot-water return pipe. The new pipe runs into the utility room and supplies hot water for not only the kitchen, but three restrooms as well as the utility room. The \$6,400 expense was funded by the Condominium Association.

Cosmetic and water-saving changes completed the project, including installation of: a new kitchen sink and faucet, new automatic shut-off faucets that deliver tempered water in two restrooms, two new urinals with auto-flush valves, and new valves on all the radiators.

Snow Removal

Winter is here so it is your responsibility to shovel your walks, the City of Chicago municipal code states "Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person charge of any building or lot of

ground abutting upon any public way or public space shall remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk."

The City requires individuals to clear a 5' wide path along the sidewalk. This width allows pedestrians in wheelchairs, people with stroller's mobility and access.

If you wish to report a location where the snow is not cleared on a sidewalk, make a "Snow-Uncleared Sidewalk" request to the City of Chicago 311 service request. Individuals who do not comply with the sidewalk snow removal ordinance can face fines of \$50. Businesses and face fines from \$250 to \$500 per day of violation.
