- 4. The iBOT program is a diamond in the rough. With a little work and investment, I feel this program could be a tremendous asset to the neighborhood and the Association.
- 5. The past several months have shown some thorough issues with our Bylaws. My plan for 2015 is to do a significant review and re-write where necessary, and then to focus on getting our OTTA work done.

With the new and returning Board Members, we have the talent to achieve all of the above and much more. I am very excited to see what this group and our volunteers can accomplish in 2015.

I would again like to thank the outgoing Board Members from the 2014 Board of Directors for their time and effort on behalf of OTTA: Robert Gibbs, Lance Hornaday and Karen Pfendler. Job well done.

2014 OTAF SPOTLIGHT: The Barcelona Prize Story

A special promotion of the Old Town Art Fair 2014 featured three prize trips for two to Barcelona, including airfare and hotel accommodations. The grand prize went to artist Jeffrey Zachmann (traveling with his wife Deb) who received the most *Patron's Choice* votes of the more than 3,400 total submitted ballots from paying patrons of the Fair. A raffle drawing of voting Art Fair patrons was won by Debbi Ryan, an elementary school teacher from Bartlett, Illinois, who was unable to travel during the designated travel dates and was granted a cash prize. A raffle drawing of paying attendees of the First Sight benefit gala was won by Linda Wedenoja, Chair of the Art Fair Program Editor Committee. Also traveling to Barcelona at their own expense were

Old Town Art Fair Chair and trip organizer, John Knoche and his wife Pat Cassiday, art fair graphic designer and one of the Barcelona prize sponsors Michael Garzel and his partner Jeffrey Souva, and Claire Leaman, Treasurer of the Old Town Triangle Association. While plans to see the Magic Fountain had to be postponed due to a rally in support of the symbolic vote for Catalan independence, the attraction was well worth the wait for the three of us who returned the following evening. I'll never forget how Michael Garzel appeared to risk life and limb to capture with my camera a unique angle of a statue overseeing the grand view surrounding the colorful dancing waters, as Jeffrey Souva and I held our breath until he stepped back down off the ledge.

Antoni Gaudi's awe-inspiring Casa Batlló, Sagrada Familia and Parc Güell were worthy destinations to experience the celebrated Catalan architect's impressive talents. But, thinking that you can walk between major attractions that don't look that far on the map might not be so wise. Take it from those who remarkably did, like Jeff and Deb Zachmann, who kept thinking it was just a little farther to Parc Güell. And, on a separate but equal journey, Claire Leaman and I, who took a clue from a local and finally hopped in a cab, readily agreeing that it was a very good decision.

An informative guided tour by locals Maria Bonet and Joan Miró provided a fascinating introduction to the famed Las Ramblas, the Gothic Quarter, La Boqueria, the Plaza de Sant Felip Neri, El Raval, Santa Before we left for the trip, many people would say "Barcelona! That's my favorite city in the world!" Now I know why. Simply amazing. Now it's my favorite city in the world as well.

An unexpected treat during a solo excursion to the beach area of La Barceloneta was a sidewalk musical performance by a reggae band of musicians with a tuba, performing "No Woman, No Cry." Go figure.

Others reported visiting family and friends, the Picasso Museum, and shopping (of course ... including Claire on the hunt for the perfect espadrilles), among numerous other pursuits and destinations during the trip.

In addition to attending Sunday Mass in the grand Gothic Cathedral, another significant memory was a group visit to the recently renovated Sant Pau, the world's largest Art Nouveau Site, which is destined to become the city's next major tourist attraction.

Dining in Barcelona offered a variety of mouth-watering options. For those who may visit Cornelia, be sure to tell the owner with the orange pants that John from Chicago sent you. And, take Pat Cassiday's lead and order merluza in Barcelona whenever it appears on any menu.

Paying with euros, traveling by metro or cab, and finding the way around was easier after a few days. The amount of walking was significant. A pedometer registered 19,745 steps on the most intensive day of trekking.

It was "grounding" to travel with seasoned international air travelers to, through, and from airports. I consider the support, guidance, and wonderful company of Claire, John, Pat, Michael, and Jeffrey throughout the trip as part of the prize. And, the bonus was also to meet and experience Barcelona with the Old Town Art Fair Patron's Choice winner,

A FAREWELL TO | Dr. Henry Betts - An Old Town Treasure

Dr. Henry Betts, a pioneer in the field of rehabilitation medicine, led efforts to transform the Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago into the nation's leading facility of its kind. Sadly, Dr. Betts' life came to an end at age 86 on January 4, 2015. A resident of Old Town, Henry moved to the Triangle with his wife Monika in 1974, when Old Town was still somewhat dicey – you

might find someone picking the flowers you had planted by your front door! The Betts bought a building that was formerly a garage, with an upstairs apartment for the chauffeurs of the wealthy people living on Lake Shore Drive. They turned it into a charming house with a spectacularly large garden, which originally had been used as a work yard for limousines. Monika, an expert gardener, also served as President of the OTTA.

Henry told me he liked a neighborhood where people could drop in on each other, meet on the street, and help one another. He and Monika showed the same neighborhood values of teamwork and mutual respect that he used to build the Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago into a hospital of international prominence.

My family and I moved to Old Town in 1985, and one of my fond memories is of the Betts and Bross children and some of their friends performing a play in our garden – the grownups sitting in the garden and the children performing on the porch. The play was the Grimms' fairy tale Mother Holle. For the snow effect, they scattered pillow cases full of white plastic beans from an upper window. The alarmed parents stood up and called out, "No more snow!" It took us weeks to get the beans out of the neighboring gardens.

Henry will be greatly missed by his family, friends, and neighbors and all the people he helped throughout his life.

NEIGHBORHOOD SPOTLIGHT | The Church of the Three Crosses: A Celebrated Good Neighbor

First of all, let's clear up the myth about the name of the church. It didn't come from the blending of three congregations, as is widely believed. The name was chosen in 1966 by the merged congregation of two Lincoln Park churches founded by German immigrants and that name represents the three crosses at the crucifixion of Jesus and the people on them, including a thief who rejected religion.

The two merged churches were the Second Evangelical United Brethren Church, founded in 1852 (located at Chicago at Wells, then Sedgwick at Wisconsin), and St. James United Church of Christ, founded in 1896 (located at 1718 N. North Park). The wonderful 40th Anniversary 1966-2006: A Brief History booklet written by member Barry Smith, tells the history with a fantastic timeline of the 100+ years of mergers and renamings that shaped these two churches through the 1960s. The changing demographics of the day and urban renewal plans presented unique opportunities for the leaderships of both congregations which resulted in the creation of a single, new ecumenical congregation, the Church of the Three Crosses.

Throughout the years, both "predecessor churches" were active with and good neighbors of the Old Town Triangle Association. Both churches participated in the Annual Old Town Art Fair selling pies,




This montage shows the church after completion in 1974 and in 2014. The 1873 bell from the old Second Church was installed in 1980.

providing a Children's Corner and welcoming artists and neighbors in their "places of welcome." This continues today with "The Grill on the Green" which is the Church of the Three Crosses' primary fundraising event of the year, raising close to 10% of their annual budget, and "friendraising," as it brings together much of the congregation's family and friends to work on this common pursuit.

In 1973 and for \$65,000, the Church of the Three Crosses bought the portion of the decommissioned Ogden Avenue corridor that was designated for Second Evangelical United Brethren Church in 1964 – six lots and an alley. Hired in 1972, architect Ralph Anderson designed an open format building that could easily be used as a community gathering place as well as a house of worship. The small congregation of 100 men, women, and children worked tirelessly raising money and awareness to realize the plans conceptualized in 1961. The first services were held at the new building on August 18, 1974 with folding chairs on concrete floors for those attending the services. The organ was installed in December. Final tally on new building costs, including land and architect, was \$450,000. Finishing touches continued over the years, including the old bell's installation and first ringing on May 25, 1980.

Today, the Church of the Three Crosses continues to be the cutting-edge institution it has always been, where an ethical framework gives members a way to live and a place to rest and refresh. In the spirit of the Pilgrims, who created the earliest progressive religions in response to religious persecution in England in the 1500s and 1600s, the Church of the Three Crosses carries on as the tolerant, respectful, engaged and involved spiritual community that it's always been, welcoming all of humanity, even those who reject religion, like the thief at the crucifixion.

Writer's Notes: A few milestones of note include the "predecessor" St. James Church was sold and eventually converted into townhomes in the 1970s. The previous parsonage for St. James Church is the current single-family home, notably painted purple, at 1722 N. North Park Avenue. In 1972, Roosevelt Hospital bought the Second Evangelical United Brethren Church's building but agreed to let the church operate out of it until a new building was funded and built. Roosevelt Hospital, near the corner of Sedgwick and Wisconsin, gave way to the 30 townhomes of Belgravia Terrace in the early 1980s. February is "Heart Month". It's the season we paint the town red and remember to tell our special loved ones how much we care, especially on Valentine's Day. We celebrate with heart shaped decorated cookies, red-velvet cupcakes and chocolates. It is also the month the American Heart Association reminds us to eat heart healthy food and exercise regularly. Here are my top food picks for celebrating and/or nurturing the heart.

SALMON is the poster child for "heart healthy" food. High in omega-3 fatty acids, it helps lower blood pressure, may lower cholesterol and is an anti-inflammatory according to the American Heart Association. Try this easy non-recipe idea you can do in minutes - Mix 1 tbsp. each mustard and mayonnaise, spread over an 8oz. filet of salmon. Broil until topping is brown and bubbling, about 6 min. for a 1-inch thick piece. Serves 2.



Blood Orange Juice

BLOOD ORANGES named for their deep red flesh are in season right now and considered sexy and loved by trend spotters. The red color is due to anthocyanin, an antioxidant found in many red fruits and vegetables. Start your day with fresh squeezed red blood orange juice which packs more flavor than the classic orange variety and is an excellent source of vitamin C. No time for juicing? Blood orange juice is available at Plum Market at 1233 N. Wells Street. Or treat yourself to a nutrient packed "celebration red" menu favorite - Juice Bigalow made with beet juice, apples, carrots, lemon and ginger at Real Good Juice Co. at 1647 N. Wells Street.

Did you know CHOCOLATE, especially dark chocolate 70% or higher cocoa content, is not only a favorite gift on Valentine's Day, but it is also good for the heart? According to Cleveland Clinic, cocoa beans are rich in a class of plant nutrients called flavonoids. Flavonoids help protect plants from environmental toxins and help repair damage. When we eat foods rich in flavonoids, it appears that we also benefit from this "antioxidant" power. Could an "a truffle a day" be next prescription for good health?

RED WINE is the perfect choice to toast Valentine's Day and your health. Resveratrol, an antioxidant in red wine, might be a key ingredient in red wine that helps prevent damage to blood vessels and reduce low-density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol. However, most research on resveratrol has been done on animals, not people, according to Mayo Clinic. Let's raise our glasses and toast to more research.

TEA is the new marinade. Marinating meats in tea not only imparts an herbaceous and vigorous flavor, but may also reduce the risk of heart disease and help reduce potentially cancerous compounds in meat. Different kinds of teas have different flavor profiles. When using tea as a marinade, it is best to use brewed and cooled real tea and not the instant variety. Use a strong brew if

you really want the flavor of the tea to come through. For Tea-Marinated Steak: mix ¼ cup strong brewed black tea with 2 tbsp. each maple syrup and teriyaki sauce and ½ tsp. black

Round out the menu with nutrient rich red fruits and vegetables such as tomatoes (fresh or sundried), strawberries, cranberries, raspberries, red grapes, pomegranates, red pear, apples, red bell peppers, beets, radicchio and kidney beans. Happy "Heart Month"!

Only two elementary schools received 4.9 and only five elementary schools received 4.8. LaSalle has also been nominated

by the Chief State School Officer (CSSO) for the National Blue Ribbon Award as an "Exemplary High Performing School." This is a national award given by the U.S. Department of Education. The school also has a new solar array installed by Eco Solar on the south side of the building. This allows for the students to study renewable energy while they learn about reducing our dependence on fossil fuels.

La Salle's 26th Annual La Posada celebration was held on December 16. 2014. You may have seen a number of children and a Mariachi Band walking around the perimeter of the school property that day. La Posada is a traditional Spanish holiday procession reenacting the search by the expectant Mary and Joseph for an Inn. The children and parents go to houses and businesses surrounding the school and sing traditional Spanish Christmas Carols. LaSalle's World Language curriculum not only involves teaching our students how to speak and write a foreign language, but also the traditions of those cultures.

Finally, parents were recently notified that LaSalle's principal, Elisabeth Heurtefeu, would be leaving her position this school year. Saddened by her departure, everyone is happy for her as she follows other opportunities. She has been a strong leader for the school and supporter of the community.
