### COMMITTEE NEWS | Nominating Committee | Anne Giffels, Chairperson and Lucy Baldwin, Phyllis Hall, Tomas Leibig

The Old Town Triangle Association Nominating Committee has completed its work and is presenting a slate for the membership vote at the Annual Meeting on Thursday, January 28, 2016. A membership vote will occur at the Annual Meeting.

The foundation of our work was the Bylaws of the Old Town Triangle Association (OTTA). The Bylaws helped us understand our role as well as the duties of the Officers and Directors of the Board.

The Committee will be following up with

a detailed description of our process with accompanying documentation, but in brief, we asked each candidate to submit an application and submit to an interview with the members of the Nominating Committee. We started with the understanding that the six open positions (President, 1st Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary, and two Directors) were not provisionally set aside for a returning Officer or Director, and all candidates had an equal opportunity to be nominated. Once the interviews were completed, the committee

discussed the capabilities, skills and experience of each candidate and prepared a slate that reflects a mix of institutional knowledge, leadership and fresh perspective to represent the Old Town community.

We conducted a vigorous outreach to identify candidates, from announcements posted on the OTTA website and neighborhood news, personal interactions and recommendations from members. We had more candidates than open positions, and we're very pleased with the participation of the community.

### COMMITTEE NEWS | Historic District / Planning & Zoning | By Karl Hjerpe, Chairman, Triangle Resident since 1996

We've added a new tab under "ABOUT OTTA" on our website (www. oldtowntriangle.com) called "Maps". We started with a map delineating the boundaries of the Chicago Historic Landmark District and a link to the Chicago Zoning Map, from the city's website. We eventually hope to include one or two more historical maps. This will allow homeowners a little more perspective on where they live and any zoning issues that may arise with their property.

The Old Town Triangle is actually several superimposed districts. The overall domain of the OTTA is bounded by North Avenue, Clark Street, and the shadow of what used to be Ogden Avenue. An interesting walk follows that shadow; you'll notice no buildings predating the 1960s along the length of it, and some odd diagonal property boundaries and building facades. In 1977, the City of Chicago designated the contiguous area of houses we know as the Old Town Triangle Landmark District. Most of the homes in the Triangle fall into this district and it is this designation on a building that places restrictions on exterior

renovations. A home in the landmarked district cannot qualify for a building permit without approval from the Commission on Chicago Landmarks. Finally, in 1984 the Triangle was also accepted into the National Register of Historic Places. Though similar to it, this district comprises several more houses than the Chicago Historic Landmark District. Not at all confusing, right?!

To use the City Zoning Map https://gisapps.cityofchicago.org/ zoning/, follow the link and accept their liability disclaimer. Enter the address of interest and the dynamic map will appear with the surrounding blocks. On the right side, you can select desired highlights. Under the "Zoning" tab you'll find shading for the Historic Landmark District, National Register of Historic Places, as well as buildings subject to "orange" or "red" demolition-delay restrictions. Be sure to check the blocks for the desired designations in order for them to display on the map. Enjoy your zoning research!

#### Dinotto: An Old Favorite Gets a New Look

Have you tried the new Dinotto Pizza e Vino yet? This well-known and well-loved neighborhood gem, serving Italian food to Old Town residents for 25+ years, has moved to a new location and has a totally new look at 1551 N. Wells Street. Fortunately, many of the recipes, kitchen staff and front-of-house are still the same! Dinotto's has long been a neighborhood spot and they love to take care of us. The move has been a very positive one, with the new location featuring an updated look and atmosphere that's more modern and more in style with the neighborhood – business has been brisk.

#### Neapolitan Pizza: A Winning Addition to the Menu

Brand new to the menu is authentic Neapolitan pizza.... the real thing. In order to be certified, Dean had to attend a week-long class to learn the secrets and techniques to perfecting Dinotto's Neapolitan pizza and earn the coveted "VPN" designation (Vera Pizza Napoletana). Currently there are only 40 "VPN" designations in the United States - a rather select group!

The restaurant also uses an authentic wood-burning pizza oven from Naples that burns Oak and Cherry wood at 900 degrees. It's so large it barely fit through the front door of the restaurant. It burns so hot it takes just 90 seconds to cook a pizza!

While the pizza is new and a must-try, loyal patrons will be glad that many old favorites are still available, including pumpkin ravioli, risotto, grilled calamari, and Osso Bucco.

### **GRANTS AWARDS SPOTLIGHT** | LaSalle Language Academy Celebrates Blue Ribbon Award!

Friday morning, October 2, LaSalle Language Academy, our school in the neighborhood and an OTTA Grant Awardee, was nationally recognized for outstanding scholastic achievement and measurable improvements in key areas. Secretary of Education Arnie Duncan had announced earlier in the week that LaSalle would be honored with the **2015 National Blue Ribbon Award**, one of 300 or so schools in the entire country to be honored out of 99,000. That's a big deal. LaSalle, and its recently retired principal, Elizabeth Heurtefeu, presented a 60-page application highlighting quantifiable advancements. It was the only school in CPS to be awarded the honor this year. LaSalle Language Academy, as its name suggests, has a focus on 4 languages: Spanish, French, Italian, and Mandarin. Kids from Kindergarten through 8th grade choose to study at least one foreign language through all 9 years.

That Friday was a day with beautiful weather, and great joy for the LaSalle community, but it was full of irony. At 9:30am dignitaries who are tied to the community began assembling on the stage outside on the playground. All of the school - Principal Beth Bazer, Assistant Principal Kimberly Miller, former principals Heurtefeu and Amy Narea, 40 teachers and staff, a number of former teachers, some 560 students, and many parents - wore small blue ribbons and were dressed in school colors (yellow and blue), like the balloons decorating the stage, and the crepe paper on all the fences surrounding the school. Earlier that morning, three weeks into the school year, the last cross walk lines were painted on the newly paved streets bordering the school. It was a construction project that had taken too long and made it hazardous just to get to the school. Now, just in time for Mayor Emanuel to celebrate LaSalle's achievements, it was a clean walk on to the playground. No less than nine news organizations - CBS, NBC, ABC, WGN, and a few print and internet sources - captured the moments to spin a story mostly about irony. Their news was about how the Mayor had inaccurately stated the graduation rates of CPS high schools. And Arnie Duncan, our City's former head of CPS, had resigned his role as Secretary of Education, just about the same moment as LaSalle's pep rally. Barbara Byrd Bennett, the former CEO of CPS, had already been indicted.
