## <sup>#</sup> 2021 ANNUAL <sup>#</sup> MEETING SUMMARY

On Thursday, January 28th the Old Town Triangle Association held its Annual Members' Meeting. This year due to the COVID-19 pandemic the meeting was held virtually via Zoom. While we all hope and expect that next year we will be able to join each other's company for an in-person Annual Meeting, the virtual format was successful and enabled us to cover several agenda items.

Four Committee Reports were shared with members—Finance, Neighborhood Improvement, Membership & Communications, and Historic District/Planning & Zoning. Additionally, an update on the status of the Old Town Art Fair (OTAF) was presented which indicated that several artists have already confirmed their interest in participating in the 2021 OTAF, although no decisions have yet been made about the status of it.

Karen Pfendler provided remarks, and shared her gratitude, for having served as the Association President for the last two years. An open forum for member questions was held with several important issues raised for the 2021 Board to consider as they start their work, including questions about the state of OTTA membership and the federal lawsuit.

The meeting concluded with an announcement of the results of the 2021 Board election. There was very good turnout with 63% of members casting a vote in the election. Zac Bleicher and Carly Jenkins ran unopposed and will be new Directors on the Board. Ed Sokolofski and Darius Tandon also ran unopposed and will continue in their roles as Association Treasurer and Secretary, respectively. Chris Nelson was elected Vice-President in a contested election. He obtained 166 votes, while the other candidate, John Postel, received 53 votes. Dorothy DeCarlo was elected President in a contested election. She obtained 167 votes, while the other candidate, Karen Pfendler, obtained 59 votes.

A note of appreciation to the Nominating Committee members who assisted with ensuring the integrity of the vote count, and all members who voted.

### HISTORIC DISTRICT/PLANNING & ZONING COMMITTEE | Karen Pfendler, Chairperson

The Old Town Triangle is one of Chicago's historic districts and it is protected by law.

The HD/PZ Committee of the Old Town Triangle Association operates in concert with the Commission on Chicago Landmarks (CCL). Property owners who are considering a rehabilitation project are encouraged to make a presentation of their plans to the HD/PZ Committee. The HD/PZ exists to help CCL in addressing the large number of requests they receive. We have worked closely with CCL for over 40 years, and they have historically been of immense overall benefit to us. While property owners could go directly to CCL, it is likely that CCL will encourage the owners to present to



the HD/PZ first.

HD/PZ adheres to the official Renovation Guidelines established by the Landmarks Commission. After reviewing the plans, making recommendations based on the CCL guidelines, and following up with the owner, a determination is made by the HD/PZ committee to either support or object to the project because it does not meet the established guidelines. Owners sometimes make several appearances before our committee. A letter is subsequently sent to Landmarks stating our committee's opinion.

If the property owner opposes HD/PZ's opinion, they can go directly to CCL, which has the

ultimate authority to decide on the project, which may also require Zoning Department approval for needed variances to proceed.

While we have not met since March 2020 for any specific project, we make it a point to be aware of the property work going on in the Triangle. We make sure permits are posted where required, safety procedures are in place, and that the visible scope of the work meets the allowances displayed on the permits. This Committee plays a significant role in helping to protect preservation within our historic district. It has been my privilege to be the Chairperson of this invaluable committee.

### EVENTS COMMITTEE | Elaine Frei, Chairperson

In a time where events need to be reimagined, the Events Committee developed a three-part series entitled "Connecting with Art" intended to engage, connect, and enliven the community of Old Town during a pandemic. The first event in November 2020 encouraged residents to consider their windows as frames for a community art share. The "Windows of Old Town" event allowed neighbors to experience art from afar and socially distanced.

### NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE |

The mission of the Neighborhood Improvement Committee (NIC) is to develop and maintain the physical environment of the Old Town Triangle including improvement of open spaces, green areas, sidewalks, and parkways. Our neighborhood contains six parks, and our goal is to keep the parks safe and aesthetically pleasing.

The Old Town Art Fair is our primary fundraiser. With no Fair in 2020, the budget for NIC was cut in half. The team did excellent work with what they had. Existing contracts were maintained for tree trimming, parkway and park clean-up efforts, and garbage maintenance. The team worked collaboratively with both the 43rd and 2nd Alderwoman/Alderman, respectively, for issues and assistance, as well as ComEd. CDOT. etc.

Aside from continued maintenance and reporting, the team walks the neighborhood almost daily, keeping an eye on deterioration. Aside from specific issues needing attention, they share the joy of chalk drawings, birds singing, and chess-playing.

Even with budget cuts, we were able to have 20 new trees planted in the neighborhood from the city, a tree on Wisconsin Street from Davey Tree, and seven Crabapple trees from the Department of Forestry. Also, a few neighbors even planted trees in common areas to help enhance our tree-lined streets. The tree canopies that line our streets come with work and effort!

Many thanks to the NIC, especially Corinne Svoboda, who leads the Parks & Parkways Committee, and Dan Baldwin, who leads the Tree Committee. As we look ahead to Spring, restorative planting is top-of-mind, as well as looking at fencing around trees, narrow parkways, cleaning and maintenance of our decorative lamps, and of course, a neighborhood spring cleaning! Looking at the snow right now, green trees, and spring flowers will be a welcomed sight!

## Four Local Businesses Reinvent for Success

Many of our local iBOT businesses managed to discover new ways to survive the pandemic. What was their formula to stay afloat, despite the restrictions, eliminating "business as usual" for almost a year?

Ryan See, managing partner of The Kennison restaurant responded, "We have altered our menu to make it more Take-Out / Delivery friendly. We launched a Ghost Kitchen, Gettysburgers Chicago, which offers Kennison quality food with a focus on burgers at discounted rates. (Available through GrubHub and DoorDash.) Most importantly, we have been selling a ton of To Go Cocktails available through the website: https://www.thekennison.com/, We batch each of our Specialty Cocktails and sell them in ready-to-drink tamperproof To Go containers. This has been a huge success."

As far as offering these services in the future, The Kennison plans to keep the Ghost Kitchen post-pandemic. If the City allows them to continue to sell To Go cocktails, they most certainly keep that revenue stream as well. Mr. See went on to say, "In addition, The Kennison has always supported charitable organizations by donating a small portion of food sales every month to a local charity of their choosing. For obvious reasons, it has been BOKA Gives over the past few months, which goes directly back to supporting our employees' health benefit packages, etc. That will continue for the foreseeable future, and then we'll return to our rotation of different local charities post-pandemic."

Kim Hack, owner of Cocoa + Co. said, "The Virtual Chocolate Tastings we've been doing have really kept us afloat. Store traffic is way down for the obvious reasons, so being able to reach audiences outside the neighborhood and outside the state has made all the difference. Our e-commerce business has picked up as well, and that, too, is welcome." The next virtual tasting event is "Romance of Chocolate" on February 14, at 3pm. Explore the history of cacao, its chemical make-up, and learn about some of the colorful characters who considered it essential in matters of the heart. Virtual tasters receive an assortment of chocolates from around the world, are taught how to taste and savor chocolate and learn its history, health benefits and nuances of each chocolatier. Tickets are available through their website: https://cocoaandco.com/.

Benjamin Pourkhalili, owner of Galleria Liqueurs, has served the neighborhood for 20 years. Galleria Liqueurs, with 600 wine labels, 300 spirits and microbrewery beers, is dedicated to helping people make selections, recommend pairings, offer delivery and even personalized gift wrap with handwritten messages. Contactless curbside pickup is a new service with the pandemic, which has been well-received and will continue in the future. Mr. Pourkhalili went on to say, "Along with our personal service, we offer iBOT neighbors a 10% discount with any purchase." Learn more at https://www. gallerialiguors.com/.

Twin Anchors' Gina Manrique, one of the owners, said, "Currently Twin Anchors is open M-Th 4pm to 9pm, Friday 4pm to 10pm, Saturday noon to 10pm and Sunday noon to 9pm offering indoor dining. Outdoor dining is offered most nights in an area that is covered and sheltered on the sides with wall heaters. Note that customers would still want to dress appropriately. The only time we may not be opened outside is if there is falling snow or if it is in the 20's or below."

Twin Anchors offers carry-out and delivery daily, available through their website: https://twinanchorsribs.com/. There is also a link to order online for in-person free pick up. Customers may also call us for a pick-up at (312) 266-1616. Orders can be



picked up at the bar, or curbside, by request. One successful additional offering has been cocktailsto-go. Five different cocktails are available, made to-order and sealed in a bottle to take home along with its garnish. Another new addition, Twin Anchors now takes reservations! "We did a fundraising "gofundme" early on to help support our staff, but that ended after funds were distributed. Despite the tremendous decrease in business the last 10 months, we have been doing our best to keep Twin Anchors going into its 89th year," said Gina.

Gina summed it up for Twin Anchors and all the neighborhood business owners — "We are very grateful for our neighbors' support during the pandemic and hope to see everyone in person this year now that in-person dining has resumed."



# A FAREWELL TO JOAN BEUGEN

Longtime Old Town Triangle member and resident, Joan Beth Beugen, age 77, passed away December 23, 2020. Joan and her loving husband of 54 years, Sheldon "Shel", were regular participants with the Old Town Triangle Association's activities. Members since 1976, they volunteered for the Old Town Art Fair, opened their garden for the annual Garden Walk and were active with the Triangle Center Gallery. Joan and Shel moved to the Triangle in 1976 after completing construction on their modern single-family home at 1708 N. Hudson Street.

Joan graduated from Northwestern University and was the Founder, CEO and Creative Director of Cresta Creative. For over 40 years Joan produced corporate and marketing communication and has literally hundreds of industry awards to her credit. She was also the co-founder and president of The Creative Establishment, Inc., the nation's largest corporate presentation agency at the time with offices in Chicago, New York City and San Francisco.

Joan's business achievements were recognized often. Notably, she was named New York YWCA Entrepreneur of the Year, NAWBO Entrepreneur of the Year, and Chair of the Illinois Delegation to the White House Conference on Small Business. She has been a member of The Committee of 200, The Economic Club of Chicago, the Chicago and Florida chapters of the International Women's Forum (IWF), the IWF International Board of Directors, The Chicago Network, Northwestern University Committee of 100, and The Court Theater at the University of Chicago Board of Directors.

She will be remembered as a loving wife, mother, nana and leader and mentor to many...and deeply missed by all. We are lucky to have had her as our neighbor and friend!
