

# 71 YEARS OLD IN 2021, NOTHING STOPS THE **OLD TOWN ART FAIR**

Since 1950, the Old Town Art Fair has brought thousands of artists and visitors to The Triangle, always in early June. As it turns out, it jumpstarts the summer festival season in Chicago and it's become the #I outdoor juried art show in the United States. It takes an army of volunteers and the generosity of spirit of neighbors to enable this gigantic event to happen. Nothing stops this force of nature...except another force of nature in 2020, COVID-19. And then there was that time in 1963 when the local politics almost forced the cancellation of the Fair!

The excerpt below is from page 23 of the "Old Town Art Fair 1950-1999: Fifty Years and Counting" written by the 50th Anniversary Committee, chaired by Diane Gonzalez. The 1999 OTAF was chaired by Norman Baugher.

"Politics almost caused the cancellation of the fair in 1963 when Alderman Paddy Bauler refused to allow an admission charge or the sale of food. Alderman Bauler also insisted that the sidewalks be kept open for pedestrians and that no gates be allowed....The fair committee...sent a delegation to City Hall... and met with Mayor Daley to plead their case. ... The next night...a permit had been granted. It is rumored that Alderman Bauler's restrictions were related to his recent election losses...The following year, to avenge Old Town's defiance of his authority, Bauler held his own art fair on OTAF weekend in his saloon at North & Sedgwick (now an empty parking lot)."



EDITOR'S NOTE: Mathias "Paddy" Bauler was a Chicago saloonkeeper and Alderman of the 43rd Ward, from 1933-1943 and again from 1947-1967.

# NEIGHBORHOOD SPOTLIGHT | The Marvel & Delight of the Sidewalk Chalk Art

To be a magician is to have the secret powers and exceptional skills of surprise. Add a touch of delight and you get sheer joy and enchantment. That's what Caitlin Hill is...a magician, and you can feel it when in her presence, even with masks on!

Using the facade of her house and with her husband Vince Curtin and their two grade school daughters, they created a special new world-during-COVID – in the windows or on the sidewalk outside of their home on Sedgwick at Menomonee. Messages of inspiration and whimsical drawings got our attention. Caitlin connected with us at a time when our fast-paced lives came to a screeching halt and our worlds got very small.

It all started with the "bear hunts" in the early days of COVID-19. Instead of teddy bears in her windows, Caitlin displayed LOL Dolls – big-eyed, tiny collectible dolls – with conversation bubbles featuring personal stories taped over their little heads. They got a lot of attention. And a lot of smiles!

Next came The Windows of Old Town, conceptualized by neighbor Danielle Klinenberg as "art with heart at a distance"! For that "exhibit", Caitlin featured the artwork of her brother, Chicago artist Robert "Booby" Hill, a series of bold kitsch pen & ink renderings, and poof! The Window Gallery was born.









Then fourth grader Ava and Kiera, in second grade, started displaying their own art. Caitlin mimicked the gallery nights in River North by "hosting" First Fridays and solicited favorites from passersby with Peoples' Choice Awards. Neighbors loved the Window Gallery with all its post-it messages. Instagram postings boosted the number of sightseers and conversations, no surprise.

With the warming weather, the Window Gallery expanded to the sidewalk with amazing and magical chalk drawings by the girls and their friends. The perfect outdoor, socially distancing activity, Caitlin divided the sidewalk and offered themes to inspire the girls' artwork. The sidewalk soon became a message board with encouraging phrases and quotable quotes. Caitlin left a basket

with a rainbow of big, fat sidewalk chalk on her front stoop, all day, every day, so we could draw, too, and the gallery was renamed The Corner Gallery.

"We moved here eight years ago, and I missed interacting with our neighbors when COVID struck. Each of these different "exhibits" drew people in. It seemed that they made people happy. Us, too. This has been awesome for our family!" Caitlin told me.

The Corner Gallery was a phenomenon. It's worth a mention that Eva and Keira's desks were moved to the living room and positioned looking out the windows overlooking the whole scene outside! They saw everyone's reactions and watched as people responded to Caitlin's COLOR YOUR HEART OUT message in chalk. Neighbors would

run to 1801 after a rainfall to see what survived and what was newly added...and it always delighted. The chalk drawings became chalk paintings with the accidental – and then deliberate – addition of rain and use of water. The giant, colorful fairy wings that appeared one day were fantastic in and of themselves; but they weren't complete until Eva lay on the ground between them to become a fairy princess! It was performance art!

Neighbors throughout the Triangle started making art with chalk on their sidewalks. So, thank you Caitlin, for magically transforming our neighborhood and giving us a happy place – your dynamic, interactive corner of The Triangle. You and your family delighted and inspired many!



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# A FAREWELL TO

Salli Eley – Neighbor and Art Fair Chair

1968-1969 General Art Fair Chair, Salli Eley, passed away on January 20, 2021. Originally from Cedar Falls, Iowa, a young Salli – armed with her art and design talents – moved to New York City. Salli left NYC for Chicago where she met and married the late Tom Eley. They raised their sons on Wisconsin Street before they moved to Chalmers Place.

During their Triangle years, Salli and Tom were generous volunteers who did whatever had to be done. Friend and former neighbor, Mary Shea, recalled that they were fun and beloved by everyone. Both were leaders who greatly contributed for years to the success of the Old Town Art Fair.

Salli had the job of chairing the OTAF during the only time it was moved from its traditional second weekend in June. Due to Robert Kennedy's 1968 assassination, the 57th Street Fair was shifted to the second weekend of June; artists came to Salli to ask that Old Town's Fair be rescheduled to the following weekend. The request was granted. Exhibitors spread the word via a chain call, and

the 1968 Fair was a big success. Salli followed her years as Art Fair Chair by designing the OTAF posters for the next three years.


Another former neighbor, Carol Hoerger, recalled Salli's sense of humor when she revealed that for Tom's 50th birthday day, Salli hired a CTA bus to drop him off at his office near Michigan Avenue. Tom boarded and to his surprise found his bus full of neighbors. The bus then breezed on by frustrated passengers waiting at regular stops. Neighbors sang Happy Birthday when Tom reached his workplace.

In turn, Tom gave Salli a surprise birthday party and rented out the Biograph Theater on a Sunday morning. Old Town friends waited inside and their son Tom Jr. manned the ticket office. The film shown was *Gilda* starring Rita Hayworth.

Today, 50 plus years after Salli's turn as Fair Chair and poster artist, the 2021 Art Fair looms with a new set of challenges. The legacy of Salli's creative and engaging spirit survives in today's Old Town Art Fair crew of volunteers.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN **ELEMENTARY** SCHOOL, our neighborhood elementary school, has a new Principal – Dr. Eric Fay, who started on February 22, 2021. Previously Assistant Principal of William Jones College Preparatory High School for 7 years, he has been an educator for 20+ years. The Local School Council (LSC) completed the recruitment/hiring

process within 3 months. Under Dr. Fav's leadership, Lincoln students were able to transition smoothly from the remote learning phase to in-school learning.

Following spring break, 76% of Lincoln students were back in school for hybrid learning. The PTA coordinated Picture Day for hybrid and remote learners as well as a Virtual Book Fair during the remote learning phase. Parent volunteers organized grade-level outdoor gatherings in a safe and socially distant manner. Friends Of Lincoln continue fundraising activities in creative ways. EFAC, the Lincoln's French Program, has resumed. ALESMA, Lincoln's Band Program, has been offering virtual music programs. Happy 100th Birthday, Margaret Fracassi

Raise a glass and toast Margaret Fracassi, our Triangle neighbor for 82 years, who turns 100 on May 15th. On the afternoon of May 15, 1921, Margaret Mesich was born in Ironwood, Michigan, the third child of what would become a family of eight children. When she was nine years old the family moved to Wakefield, Michigan so that her dad could work in the iron ore industry. She graduated from Wakefield Township High school on June 9, 1939, Margaret heard about a couple, Rose and Peter Brackett – originally from Wakefield who now lived in Chicago, who were looking for someone to live with them and take care of their daughter, Marilyn.

On July 3, 1939 she took the train to Chicago and moved in with the Bracketts at 161 Eugenie Street, the building which currently houses the bridal shop, Lovely, at the street level of Wells and Eugenie. Margaret said, "I was so surprised the next day on July 4th, to see

some neighbors hanging out their laundry. That would never have happened on holidays in Wakefield."

She met the love of her life, Emil Fracassi, at Baldi's Tavern on Wells (currently a high rise). The couple bought a home on Concord Place in 1970 and have lived on the block for over 50 years. Emil

It is incredible to hear Margaret relate stories about the neighborhood spanning so many years, and she remembers all the details.
