Greetings Old Town neighbors! I hope everyone is into the holiday swing, enjoying traditions and creating some new ones. Our

Association had another milestone year thanks to our Board of Directors, Committees, staff, volunteers, and membership. A new feature this fall is the ad hoc Community Service Committee, an all-volunteer group working weekly to collect clothing and blankets, and prepare meals for our city's migrants, homeless, and veterans.

Thank you to Marya Lucas and the Events Committee for putting on some memorable get-togethers. Oktoberfest was attended by over 300 guests. We met some new members and connected with

neighbors and friends enjoying food, beverages, and music. The Halloween Parade was great fun for both kids and parents, marching through Old Town led by a Dixieland band, despite the rain! The Art Gallery Committee hosted a second annual Lincoln Park Art Night as well as the Student and Instructor Exhibition. This year's exhibition featured not only works of art from our instructors and students, but also the addition of a Holiday Artisan Pop-Up Shop. Thank you to Barb Guttman for organizing the many monthly artist showings throughout the year.

OTTA received a grant for \$150,000 appropriated from the "Build Illinois Bond Fund", for costs associated with capital improvements to our building, the Old Town Triangle Center. Upon notification of the grant by Representative Margaret Croke in June, the Board appointed an ad hoc Committee to oversee the development of this project. The Committee has outlined the potential scope of building improvements, interviewed architectural

consultants and will host a workshop in early January, open to members, to get further input on the building improvements program and initiate design.

Another significant achievement is the establishment of a "sister-neighborhoods" agreement between La Commune Libre de Montmartre in Paris, the Old Town Merchants and Residents Association, and the Old Town Triangle Association. Montmartre, a deeply historic area of Paris, shares the arts focus, creative history, artists, studios, and other attributes of Old Town. For 2024 we are planning events to engage our community.

Happy Holidays to all as we continue to live our Mission, Vision and Values into 2024!

The Nominating Committee is an ad hoc group of four to six people, including a current OTTA Board Member, that is chosen each year by the Board in September. They are given the task of reviewing, interviewing, and selecting candidates for Officer and Director positions from the pool of OTTA members who express an interest in serving the neighborhood.

This year's committee included OTTA Director Carly Jenkins and Old Town neighbors Katherine Keenan, Rick Rausch, Vi Daley, Caroline Vickrey, and Annette Hobbs Magier (Chair) who had the pleasure of meeting and interviewing a well-rounded group of highly qualified and motivated candidates. Interviews

were completed by October 26th. The Chair submitted the slate for the 2024 OTTA Board of Directors to the Secretary on November 1st. The Nominating Committee takes into consideration a variety of factors when selecting the slate, including previous time served on the Board, skills and expertise needed to assist committees, ability to contribute to the Board efficiently and effectively and, perhaps most importantly, an appreciation and understanding of our neighborhood's history.

The Nominating Committee was unanimous in their selection of each of the six candidates.

The slate of candidates will be presented to and approved by the OTTA Membership in an open vote that takes place on January 25th at the OTTA's Annual Meeting & Dinner. ACCESSIBILITY COMMITTEE

The mission of the Accessibility Committee is to make the Old Town neighborhood, including its streets, structures, and activities, more accessible to persons with disabilities and to enhance awareness about the needs of persons with disabilities to create a friendly, approachable environment. To that end, 2023 has been a busy year. Current completed initiatives include the renovation of the South Room Accessible Restroom for full ADA code compliance; review of The Triangle Center entry thresholds; and we worked closely with Anne Giffels, 2023 Art Fair Chair, to ensure accessibility issues were undertaken in the event planning. Initiatives for 2024 will include the Triangle Site Walk to inspect and record repair requirements for curbs, curb cuts, sidewalks, driveways, tripping hazards, etc. in The Triangle, and reporting to the Alderman's office for City action; incorporation of an ADA Accessible parking space near The Triangle Center entry; and continuation of our support for the 2024 Art Fair Committee on accessibility concerns. We look forward to recruiting new volunteers from membership and community residents to reach these and many new goals.

COMMUNITY SAFETY COMMITTEE

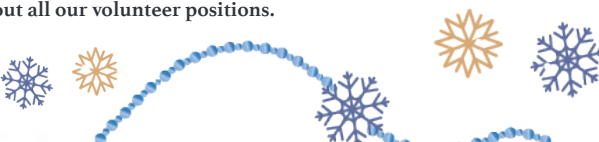
The Community Safety Committee (CSC) has developed and launched a Slack channel dedicated to community safety issues for all neighbors (including non-OTTA members) to join. If you are not familiar with Slack, it is a cloud-based freemium cross-platform instant messaging service created by Slack Technologies in 2013 and currently owned by Salesforce. While initially developed for professional, organizational and productivity communications, it has also been adopted as a community platform because of its ease-of-use and effectiveness. Over the last couple of years, the CSC has learned that one of the keys to neighborhood safety is for neighbors to get to know one another and communicate. The more eyes we have watching our streets and communicating on Slack, the safer the Triangle will be. We are still discovering the ways that Slack can assist in making our neighborhood safer, such as:

- If something unusual is spotted in the neighborhood, one can post a description (with a picture, if possible) to let neighbors know. Examples include a car parked on the street with its windows smashed, a missing pet that has been located, potential flooding caused by a backed-up sewer drain, a large group in the neighbor-

hood causing property damage, etc.

- For those who have security cameras, one can post videos to Slack of the person committing the crime, so neighbors can watch out for that person.
- If there is a crime in progress and after calling 911, one can let neighbors know so neighbors can avoid becoming a victim.
- Informing others of crimes committed in the neighborhood so neighbors know what they should look out for.

Currently, we have 60+ neighbors on Slack. If you would like to join the OTTA Slack channel, we'd love to have you. Please send an email to slackadmin@oldtowntriangle.com and say you would like to be part of the OTTA Slack channel. You will receive an invitation to join the channel as well as a User Guide. There is no cost to join. At the Annual Meeting in January, the CSC will give a report on how Slack is working. Assuming it is successful, we will continue rolling it out to the entire neighborhood.

The CSC is also working with the Alder's office and the CPD's 18th District to improve lighting on the walkway next to Ogden Mall Park (a.k.a. Chess Park), as well as identifying other safety issues in the Triangle. If you would like to join the CSC, we'd love to have you! COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMITTEE | By Pat Kilduff, Committee Member

The Community Service Committee was created to address the desire of OTTA residents who wanted to be involved in service projects but didn't know where to begin.

On September 20th, a group of OTTA residents prepared the first lunches to be distributed to the asylum-seekers at the 18th District Police Station. The following week, an initial group of six – Beth Burk, Kathy Clark, Vi Daley, Suzie Krohn, Pat Kilduff, and Sharon O'Brien along with Barb Guttman – met with neighbor Amanda Betts, the volunteer migrant support team co-leader at the 18th District, who outlined additional needs.

OTTA residents prepared lunches in batches of 10-15 and delivered to The Triangle Center for distribution to the 18th District, every other Wednesday, distributing over 480 lunches to date! A shout out to John Knoche, who is fluent in Spanish and helped us with the distribution. Since October, all of our requests to neighbors have been fulfilled,

for: clothing, shoes & boots, bedding, personal care products; donations for gift cards for the maintenance personnel; and funds for a meal for the officers at the District. Through our relationship with The Church of the Ascension (1133 N LaSalle), our donated items were available for the asylum-seekers who shop at the church's The Free Store every Wednesday, to pick out what they need.

A laundry brigade is being led by Adrienne Eltink who recognized a need for cleaning clothes and bedding. She has made 3 trips to the laundromat, providing around 75 families with clean clothes, totaling over 1,740 pounds! Consider donating to help sustain this initiative.

We have worked with a Fifth-Grade teacher at Lincoln Elementary and a Girl Scout troop leader at Francis Parker. The students donated Target gift cards for the asylum seeking children plus clothing and personal care products.

An OTTA resident suggested we do something

for the US Veterans. After meeting with her, we supported her work with Officer Margaret Benz at the 18th District, collecting clothes and shoes & slippers, which we delivered to the Little Sisters of the Poor's St. Mary's House.

We learn of more needs that can be addressed in our community and have additional information and sign-up on our website. We have collected nearly \$7,000, with some of the money designated to veteran projects, asylum-seekers laundry costs and the meal for the 18th District officers.

At the November OTTA Board Meeting, the Board resolved and approved Goals & Objectives for the next three to five years. There are seventeen objectives supporting four major goals:

- Expand Social Engagement and Membership
- Enable Collaborative Stewardship
- Improve Operations
- Expand Board Capacity to Govern

The Board also passed a resolution that committees and staff will submit to the Board each December a short list of proposed goals for the coming calendar year as well as key measures they will monitor and report. The Committees are now working on refining the Strategic Planning Committee's draft of the 2024 Goals and Measures for presentation at the OTTA Board Meeting on December 12th.

NEIGHORHOOD IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE (NIC) | By Leah Marshall, Committee Member

Over the years, NIC has been discussing composting options for the Old Town neighborhood. What does composting look like in a dense, urban area? Composting is a way for households to dispose of their leftover food waste, paper towels, pizza boxes, natural fiber products (e.g., cotton, silk, etc.), yard waste, and more. A couple of prominent composting companies use buckets or bins to accumulate this waste and empties the bins periodically, just like "normal" garbage and recycling routines. The St. Michael's High School Condominium Association, encompassing over 40 units, is leaping into the composting concept. Beyond the important positive impact on the environment, composting

potentially offers a myriad of benefits to homeowners and the community. It:

- Extends the life of the property's pipes
- Enhances the property's market value by appealing to environmentally conscious buyers
- Enriches the soil when used in landscaping
- Diverts organic waste from landfills, reducing the overall volume of garbage produced by the community.

All of the above reasons led the St. Michael's Board to consider piloting a composting program in

2024. Stay tuned to learn more about the evolution of the program and its best practices, in the coming months.

Which is Old Town, and which is

Perhaps these similarities explain why Old Town, Chicago and Montmartre, Paris are becoming “twin” Arrondissements (neighborhoods)! Did you know that Chicago and Paris have been Sister Cities since 1996? Now the Old Town Merchants & Residents Association and the Old Town Triangle Association are partnering with La Commune Libre de Montmartre, a community organization in Montmartre, Paris to “twin” our neighborhoods and share culture and friendship. Both share histories as thriving artistic communities with pasts as bohemian centers of culture. Both are rich in architectural treasures, cathedrals, cobble stone streets, and neighborhood restaurants and bars.

The Chicago Paris Cabaret Connexion,

which is an initiative of the Chicago-based non-profit Working in Concert, performed on September 3, 2023 in Paris. At that performance, the President of the Montmartre neighborhood organization made an announcement of the Old Town/Montmartre partnership. The Chicago-Paris Sister City Committee has been key in facilitating this partnership. FOODBYTES | How French is Old Town? | by Diane Sokolofski

How French is Old Town when it comes to food? I decided to scout the neighborhood and find out. Here are my discoveries.

Parlez vous francais? Don't be surprised if you are greeted by “Bonjour” or hear French spoken by the “regulars” when you walk into La Fournette at 1547 N. Wells Street. Try their authentically French flaky delectable croissants, French pastries, macarons, crusty baguettes, assorted breads, savory quiche, croque monsieur and more. La Fournette traces its origin to Alsace to the Zimmermann's family boulangerie in Schnersheim, France where they developed its expertise over four generations (110 years). In 2010, World Baking Champion, Pierre Zimmermann and his wife Michele came to Old Town and opened La Fournette. Their fresh daily assorted baked goods are not to be missed. And celebrate the French holiday traditions with their Buche de Noel for Christmas and Galette des Rois – the King cake in January.

Cozy up to a rich and delicious Parisienne Hot Chocolate and Chocolat Bonnat chocolates from France at Cocoa and Co. at 1651 N. Wells Street. Looking for French themed holiday gifts? 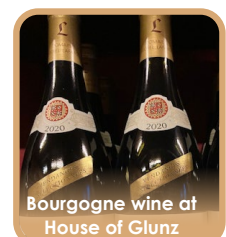

Isabelle & Jeanlouis Muller

Isabelle & Jeanlouis Muller got their first taste of life in the United States between 1990-1993 when they moved to New York City for his work on the commercial side of the steel industry. Fourteen years later, Jeanlouis' role shifted to steel production which landed him in the heart of the US steel industry in East Chicago, Indiana as a plant manager. They returned to the US with their young family, relocating to Chicago because of the availability of French immersive education through Lycée Français de Chicago in Lincoln Square, one of 522 schools in 139 countries that are part of a unique international network. The continuity of the same core curriculum across all of the educational establishments was very appealing to Isabelle & Jeanlouis – and that local network continues to be a source of French community for them, despite their (almost) empty nest!

They settled on the 300 block of Willow Street, in the heart of The Triangle, in a fabulous townhome designed by Harry Weese and featuring a wonderful courtyard garden. They loved the vibe of the neighborhood and its feeling of a village – with the narrow streets, colorful and varied homes and peaceful quiet. The proximity to everything that makes city living so pleasing is an added bonus of living in Old Town. On top of that, the transformation of the neighborhood into an artists' colony with the annual Old Town Art Fair & Garden Walk was reminiscent of back home in France, especially Montmartre – one of their favorite “walking cities” with all the bars, restaurants, small shops and outdoor dining.

There are quite a few French offerings in Chicago, they discovered pretty quickly. While Isabelle & Jeanlouis miss Kiki's Bistro and Chez Moi, they are often found at Marchesa on Wells Street, a fabulous European establishment with a heavy dose of French influence.

As Old Town becomes more French-like because of the new “twinning neighborhood” relationship with Montmartre, they suggest we celebrate **Fete de la Musique**, or World Music Day, on June 21st every year – a day of free concerts performed by professional and amateur musicians all over Old Town! Montmartre will be celebrating, too!

Gabrielle & Antoine lived in Paris but they both wanted a big new adventure in their lives. An experience in the United States was on their bucket list. When Antoine had a work opportunity to move to Los Angeles, California, they didn't hesitate. It was in 2015.

They moved from Los Angeles to Chicago in June 2018, at first renting an apartment with an incredible view of Lake Michigan. But with two children growing up, they needed something bigger. It was during summer, and they were visiting friends here – they had a nice walk in the Old Town neighborhood...for the first time. Gabrielle & Antoine instantly fell in love with St. Michaels Church and all the colored houses around it. She said to Antoine, “If we have to find a house somewhere, I would like to find it here!” They moved to their townhome facing The Midwest Buddhist Temple in August, 2020.

Old Town reminds Gabrielle & Antoine of their beautiful villages in France. The cathedral, the colored houses around it, the fountain, the Bavarian-style houses, the Art Fair. They think you can easily forget that you are in a big city when you live in The Triangle. Although the landscape and density here are very different from Montmartre, there are similarities when it comes to art. Both neighborhoods are vibrant with artistic events. They love the Old Town Art Fair and attend every year!

The family stays connected to their “local” French-roots through their children's bilingual program at Lincoln Elementary School – the Ecole Franco-Americaine de Chicago (EFAC) – where they have expanded their circle of French friends in Old Town and Lincoln Park.

Given the chance to encourage French immersion here in The Triangle, Gabrielle & Antoine have suggested we add January 6th to our calendars to celebrate the arrival of the Three Wise Men in Bethlehem (L'Epiphanie) with a cake called La Galette des Rois. Here is the short story: Dina is American (Brooklyn), Georges is French and they met in Washington, DC. They got married in 1986 and planned to spend two years in Paris before returning to the US...but those years became 20-years and included two children in their bicultural family.

Georges' career in consulting enabled them to live anywhere they wanted! Because of several business opportunities over the years, Georges had been introduced to a bit of Chicago and added it to their short list of possible places to live – Boston, Washington DC, New York, Chicago. The family traveled to each city for a weekend and Chicago won, unanimously! That was 2008.

After living in Paris, Dina & Georges thought they already had everything and more a hometown could offer. But then they found Old Town, with its stunning aesthetics, rich cultural life, a deep sense of history, lots of space and welcoming, friendly neighbors. And walkability...past the charming homes and landmarked buildings, gorgeous gardens, canopies of trees and close to Lincoln Park and The Francis Parker School, which their son attended.

Also, given the contributions of Marquis de Lafayette to the fledgling United States, Dina & Georges think a day celebrating Lafayette is in order. And the Chicago History Museum might consider a cultural exchange with the Musee de Montmartre – sharing the transformational development from an industrial area to a lively, liveable artists' colony.

The gem that Dina & Georges discovered and revere needs to be promoted, they think, so it's no longer a secret. Twinning is a good beginning.

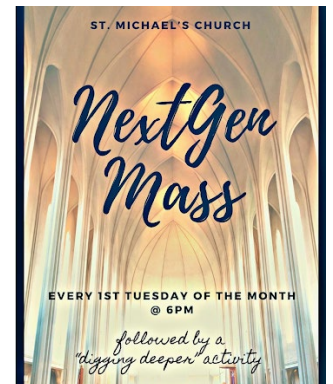

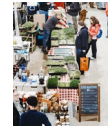
